Big C Relays welcomes Jordyn Bruce!

Welcome back to The Russ Edwards Big C Relays! After last year’s record breaking performances, we can’t wait to see who will be crowned LifeMed Alaska’s Lord of the Throwing Ring, High Step Hustler, and Fastest Alaskan. Who will come out on top in the Alaska Airlines Pentathlon and which relay team will remain King of the Hill? We’ll find out as we bring together 36 teams and more than 900 athletes from across Alaska for an action packed weekend of track and field.

After a five-year break, we are thrilled to bring back a professional athlete to not only speak to the high-schoolers, but also get on the track with them. Come watch Jordyn Bruce, a 2016 Eagle River High School alumnus and 2024 Olympic hopeful, run in the 100mH prelims on Friday. And then join us at 7 a.m. on Saturday to hear about her journey in track and field.

Also on Saturday, we have a full field lined up for the Laird Prosser Memorial Mile. Sixteen men and ten women, many who are Alaskan alumni, will compete for cash prizes. We’re also bringing back the Ric Wilson Challenge. Competitors will get on the track to run 300 meters faster than their age in seconds (the world record for this distance is just over 30 seconds).

Along with the many committed volunteers, this year’s event would not be possible without my staff and our generous sponsors. We thank you! There are many people who give countless hours to make the Russ Edwards Big C Relays what it is. We truly have become a family and enjoy working alongside each other to bring this to you.

Alaska Airlines Pentathlon

A MOST ANTICIPATED EVENT OF EVERY BIG C RELAYS IS THE ALASKA AIRLINES PENTATHLON. WATCH as six young men and women vie for the title by competing in the high jump, shot put, 100m, 300m hurdles and 800m.

During the 2023 Alaska Airlines pentathlon, South Anchorage High's Makaylen King captured the victory, despite winning just one individual event, the High Jump. Her strong second-place showings in the shot put and 300mH helped her edge in front of West Anchorage's Karsen Beagle. King will be back to defend her title this year.

Chugiak's Anders Larsen dominated the boys pentathlon with a strong first-place finish in the high jump, bounding 8 inches higher than his closest competitor. He also dominated the 800m and shot put to run away with the title, more than 400 points away from his competitors. Read more about this year's lineup at right, and see the schedule below:

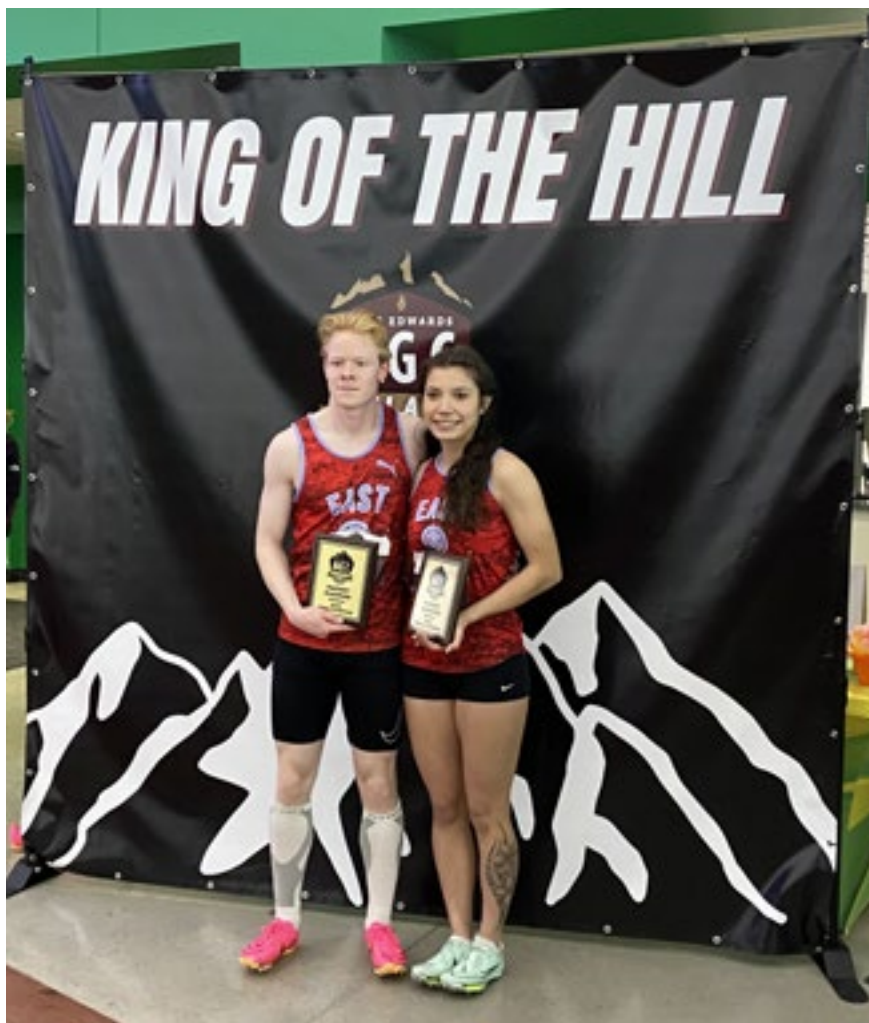
East High speedsters graduated: Who will be next on the podium?

THE RED AND BLUE OF THE EAST ANCHORAGE THUNDERBIRDS dominated the 2022 and 2023 Big C Relays Fastest Alaskan event. A crowd favorite, this is one of just two races that requires preliminaries and semis before moving on to the six-person field in the finals.

Then-junior Olyvia Mamae set the tone early in 2022, winning her prelims, semis and finals, out-sprinting the field in a scorching 12.48. She came back in 2023 to repeat that performance, finishing with a 12.62. She is now competing for North Dakota State University.

Brian Morris had a repeat performance as well, winning in 2022 with an 11.28, and 2023 with an 11.22. He is now running for the University of Alaska Anchorage.

This year's current front-runners are Chugiak senior Semaj Walker, who's season PR is 11.16, and Jihšana Williams, a Chugiak freshman who ran a 13.06 in her high school racing debut. Racing will take place both days. See below for the schedule.

THE LAIRD PROSSER MEMORIAL MILE HONORS ONE OF ANCHORAGE'S best runners, and celebrates the beauty of running as a lifelong passion. Longtime running supporter Marcus Dunbar has worked to bring some of Alaska's best distance runners to the state for this showcase event.

Lord of the (throwing) rings

Big C action will include the ever-popular Lord of the Rings throwing competition. Some of the state's best shot putters and discus throwers will compete to see if they can accumulate the largest combined distance between both events.

Scores are combined between the two events to determine the overall strong man and woman of the weekend.

"To maximize participation and still pursue excellent times and marks, we organize the Big C a little differently," said meet director Quinton Metcalf.

"Beginning with the throwing events, we utilize a two-and-two format during prelims. This means an athlete steps into the circle, takes two consecutive throws (the first two), and then steps out. Each throw is marked, but only the furthest is measured. We then work our way through the flight, repeating everyone twice (the second two). After all flights are complete, we take the top eight distances and move those athletes into the finals. These athletes then get an additional three throws."

For long jump, we run two pits with one flight per gender. This provides flexibility to those athletes also competing in high jump. During prelims each athlete has two jumps. The top eight distances move into the finals, where each athlete gets three more attempts. For high jump, we utilize a five-alive format. Five athletes will begin the event at the starting height, each having three attempts. Once one athlete clears, another will be brought in. This process will be repeated until all athletes have either cleared or missed the bar, at which time the bar will be moved up.

The International Stage

An interview with guest athlete Jordyn Bruce, Alaskan and professional multisport athlete

Big C: Give us a synopsis of your running career thus far.

Jordyn: My track career began at Eagle River High School. During my senior year, I signed my letter of intent to run track at Illinois State University, and learn to be a 400m hurdler and heptathlete. While at ISU, I was a multi-year conference champion, Division I school record holder, and NCAA Regional finalist. By my senior year, I was named Most Valuable Athlete of ISU and the Missouri Valley Conference. Currently, I coach at Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas, and train under Coach Kris Mack. I've partnered with lululemon, and continue to keep connections with ARA and the Alaska Pole Vault Club. During my professional career, I've qualified for U.S. Nationals, become the (currently unrati-fied) American record holder for the indoor heptathlon, placed second in the U.S. Decathlon National Championships, and second in the French Decathlon Championships. I'm currently working towards qualifying for the Olympic Trials and placing at the World Decathlon Championships.

Big C: How did you know or decide you wanted to continue in your sport beyond your collegiate career?

Jordyn: After college graduation, I accepted a full-time actuarial science job in Texas. I planned on just becoming a casual gym goer. No more workouts where I couldn't feel my legs or be forced to hobble down the stairs in soreness. For a few months I enjoyed retirement, and then I got antsy. I joined various teams from CrossFit to swimming, then thought, "Why did I stop doing what I actually loved?" I did my research, and decided I would find a way — simply because it's what lights a spark in me. While my first year was a difficult transition to the professional world, I eventually found a training rhythm, coach, and community. I was once again doing what I loved, and I've had so many incredible experiences since.



A 2016 graduate of Eagle River High School, Jordyn Bruce went on to an illustrious track & field career at Illinois State University and now is a professional multisport athlete sponsored by the clothing company lululemon. She is the guest athlete at this year's Big C Relays.

Big C: What unique challenges did you face as an athlete coming out of Alaska?

Jordyn: Coming out of Alaska, it's often difficult to understand the level of competition in the remainder of the nation. If you're unable to travel to compete, be sure to watch online or research times/marks. It'll be important to know where you're at if you're looking at colleges. I was also unaware that there were 200m tracks and indoor seasons! Many high schools have indoor and outdoor seasons and compete from December to May. Starting in college, it was an adjustment to stay 'on point' for such a long competition season.

Big C: What was your favorite part of the Big C as a high school athlete?

Jordyn: The Big C is one of the best Alaska track and field experiences. It shows Alaska's athletes the energy that track has, and brings the community together. It's also full of new chances. My sophomore year, I was thrown into the 100H. I'd never been afraid of a new challenge, so I thought this was no different. But, I didn't finish the race that day. I gave it all I had — twice — and never made it past the second hurdle. That's how I met Coach E (Rafael Echavarria) and the Alaska Running Academy. Since then, I went from not being able to finish the race, to running the second fastest time in the state at 14.8, and currently 13.75. I would've never become a hurdler if I didn't embrace the new opportunities that the Big C offers. Make the most of it, run the race, and meet new people in the process!
